

tree-lined on both sides so aim a little right on your second shot to offset the right to left fairway. This two-tiered green is really fast from above the hole.

Hole #9 468 yard Par 4. (Women's Par 5). Your longest drive of the day would go a long way here. Avoid the big eucalyptus tree right of the green.

Hole #10 312 yard Par 4. To help set up a possible birdie, keep your drive short of the swale by laying up to about 100 yards from the green. A ball hit over this green is generally lost. Phil Mickelson eagled this hole after driving the green and then went on that day to set a course record of 60.

Hole #11 402 yard Par 4. Great views from this elevated tee. A drive pulled slightly left will generally kick off the hill toward the fairway. A drive hit farther left can either be OB or very difficult to find, so hit a provisional ball.

Hole #12 388 yard Par 4. A beautiful hole with a challenging second shot that is generally from a side hill lie and plays a club longer. Watch out for that big, deep bunker on the left.

Hole #13 458 yard Par 4. (Women's Par 5). Longest par 4 on the back nine, OB right, and best to favor the right side of the fairway off the tee. Slightly downhill second shot plays the yardage. A difficult par awaits those who catch the greenside bunker on the right.

Hole #14 333 yard Par 4. Par is elusive if you miss the short and narrow fairway. OB right and trees on the left dictate a lay-up drive here.

Hole #15 466 yard Par 5. The easiest of our three par 5s. Avoid the fairway bunkers left and you can reach this green in two. Fairway bunker on the right is about 100 yards from the green. A putt from above the hole is extremely fast!

Hole #16 184 yard Par 3. As the lone par 3 on the back nine, it plays about a club longer than the yardage. Another very fast putt from above the hole.

Hole #17 537 yard Par 5. With a great ocean vista behind this green, a well-placed second shot that avoids the fairway bunkers left will help your chances for a birdie. The green really slopes to the left.

Hole #18 366 yard Par 4. Aim your drive toward the fairway bunker. A pulled drive to the left will catch one of five grass bunkers at the base of the hill. Add one more club for the uphill second shot and beware of the false front on this narrow green.

Directions

From the South: I-5 to La Jolla Parkway West (turns into Torrey Pines Road). Left on Girard Avenue, left at the next traffic light on Pearl Street, go two blocks and turn right on High Avenue.**

From the North: I-5 to La Jolla Village Drive turnoff. West on La Jolla Village to Torrey Pines Road, left on Torrey Pines, left on Girard Avenue, left at traffic light on Pearl Street, go two blocks and turn right on High Avenue.**

From the East: Hwy. 52 (San Clemente Canyon) to La Jolla Parkway West which turns into Torrey Pines Road. Left on Girard Avenue, left at next traffic light on Pearl Street, go two blocks and turn right on High Avenue.**

**On High Avenue, following winding road up the hill. The Clubhouse can be seen from the bottom of the hill.




Speed of Play

1. Our pace of play rating is four hours and five minutes. Please maintain your position with the group in front of yours so that your round may be completed in the allocated time or less.
2. **PLAY READY GOLF.** To help you finish your round in four hours, always be ready to play your next shot. This means hitting out of turn when appropriate.
3. When using a 3&4 bag cart attachment, please help expedite play by taking clubs with you to your next shot.
4. If at least one hole is open ahead of your group, you must allow the faster group behind you to play through.

Repair Ball Marks

Please use the Green Fix divot tool to repair ball marks on greens.

Repairing a ball mark takes just ten seconds to complete. An un-repaired mark takes over two weeks to heal.



1. Tap down divot first with putter.
2. Hold tool at a 45-degree angle.
3. Just **PUSH** around the ball mark ...do not lift, twist, or jab.
4. TAP smooth with your putter.

Use Sand to Fill Divots

Our Kikuyu grass will re-germinate more rapidly if you fill in your divot with the sand provided on carts and tees.

Driving Range & Practice Area

Please do not hit balls over the fence into the 9th or 10th fairways and the practice area on tee left. Use the reduced flight yellow balls to help minimize the risk.

Cell Phones

The use of cell phones, pagers and beepers are not permitted on the golf course or in and around the clubhouse.

Golf Course Dress Code

LADIES/JUNIOR GIRLS:

Proper golfing attire is considered to be skirts, Bermuda shorts or slacks (the length of skirts and shorts not to exceed 4" from top of the knee), and appropriate blouses, shirts, or sweaters. Specifically excluded are tennis, sun, or jogging attire, halter or strapless top, abbreviated golf skirts designed for resort wear and blue jeans or denim of any color or brand, cargo shorts or pants (cargo pockets, back flap and side pockets). Headwear, caps and visors shall be worn with bills positioned forward, etc. Approved golf shoes are required and must be changed into in the locker room, not the parking lot.

MEN/JUNIOR BOYS:

Proper golfing attire is considered to be slacks or shorts no shorter than 4" from the top of the knee, shirts with sleeves and collars, and sweaters. Shirt-tails must be tucked inside pants. Collarless tee shirts or shirts with large printing on back or cut-offs, blue jeans or denim of any color or brand, etc. or cargo shorts (cargo pockets, back flap and side pockets) are not allowed. Headwear, caps and visors shall be worn with bill positioned forward and may not be worn inside the clubhouse. Approved golf shoes are required and must be changed into in the locker room, not the parking lot.

Hole by Hole Description **by Pete Coe, PGA Head Professional**

La Jolla Country Club is best characterized by its Kikuyu fairway grass, uneven lies, and small fast greens. Views of the Pacific and gentle ocean breezes make a round of golf always enjoyable for its members and guests.

Hole #1 305 yard Par 4. A friendly opening hole rewards a drive just short of the fairway bunkers. The green, however, is reachable for long hitters as Phil Mickelson aced this one in 2003.

Hole #2 157 yard Par 3. No bunkers surround this beauty. Club pro Paul Runyun influenced its design and created a very challenging pitch for missed tee shots. One of the fastest greens on the course, and watch out for that big eucalyptus tree on the right!

Hole #3 436 yard Par 4. Dogleg left, and the first of three long par 4s on the course. Avoid the fairway bunkers left and putt from below the hole, if possible.

Hole #4 387 yard Par 4. With a nice view of the northern coastline from the tee, this hole can be a difficult par if you catch one of the two well-positioned greenside bunkers. Add one club for your uphill second shot.

Hole #5 349 yard Par 4. The left to right sloping fairway dictates a drive down the left side. A missed second shot over the hole can result in a long uphill walk back to the green.

Hole #6 405 yard Par 4. A favorite of many LJCC members, with OB left and trees right, a good drive is critical. Keep your drive on top of the landing plateau unless you're long and straight enough to drive it to the bottom of the hill. Beware of the "Hootie Hole" right of the green!

Hole #7 173 yard Par 3. Great par three, well-bunkered and disastrous if you miss long or left, and yes, the ball does break toward the ocean.

Hole #8 559 yard Par 5. The only par five on the front nine, a slight left to right drive is best. This hole is
